

Director's Mote

Every good writing teacher I've had, whether for stage or film, and that's been many over the last 50 years, has said: "Above all, write what you know. Write what you feel."

Nowhere is that more true than with Robert Harling's *Steel Magnolias*. Harling didn't make things up just to get laughs – or tears He didn't work things into some formula. After his sister Susan, the real life Shelby, died from diabetic complications after having a baby against medical advice, he was devastated, locked himself away for 10 days and wrote: "It just poured out into my typewriter in a 24/7 tsunami of Southernness. I had no idea what I'd written. I asked the first person I gave it to if it even looked like a play."

His play leapt from off-Broadway to film, with actors like Bette Davis taking him to tea so she could pitch playing Ouiser. You've probably seen the film, quite the ensemble cast!

Finding that TLT ensemble and doing whatever I can as a director to help them become a "stage family" has been my most meaningful role – these six wonderfully talented actors have made that easy – and so pleasurable! Nena and the entire team have made it happen seamlessly, so you can sit back and enjoy. Please read about all of them in this program.

Steel Magnolias does not have a collection of clever special effects. No complicated set revolves. We, as their friends, get to watch six people who really care about each other spend time together in Truvy's Beauty Salon.

We watch Harling's sister (Shelby) and his mother (M'Lynn) share their joy and pain about her wedding and the baby. We eavesdrop on den-mother, Truvy, as she takes the town's newcomer, Annelle, under her wing and helps her grow from scared young thing into a stronger woman. We share in the loving battle between old, old friends Clairee and Ouiser as they lighten the mood and fight to be Queen-of-the-Salon.

The essence of *Steel Magnolias* is that it's real, so true to people we all know, even if we don't live in Chinquapin (Chik-ah-pin) Parish (or the real-life Natchitoches, LA where Harling and his family lived). Interesting fact: Harling agreed to write his play for film mainly because the producer agreed to shoot it in Harling's home town – pop. 16,664. Imagine bowling next to Julia Roberts. Having a potluck with Sally Field. The staunch Republicans even put out "Dukakis for President" signs because Olympia Dukakis' cousin, Mike, was running for President.

Steel Magnolias, the play, has more than endured. It has grown in popularity across the world. The relationships are genuine whether we're talking about six friends in Tacoma or Auckland or Venice. Beauty salons are universal. So is the enduring love of these six magnolias.

At a 25th anniversary performance of his play, Robert Harling said: "Listen to the voices of those you love, and, if you're lucky, you'll hear them forever."

Elliot Weiner (Director)

It was the seventies and I was combing long (side) hair across the top to "cover" the bald spot. It was very hot and I couldn't drive with the car windows down because the wind would break the hair spray seal. I went to an intensive 2-week pottery workshop in the Tennessee mountains, couldn't wear a hat and had to scratch my head with my pinkie – the hair spray seal you know. After a couple hot days of digging clay, building kilns and creating, another potter said, "Why the hell do you do that (comb over)? It looks stupid and you're making yourself miserable." I pulled my side hair into a pony-tail and never combed-over again.

Nena Curley (Assistant Director/Stage Manager)
