



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DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Very early on a midsummer morning I woke up to discover I could not move, Not a single muscle. I could barely breath, swallow or speak. It was Thursday, July 5, 1962. I was completely paralyzed, the result of a rare virus. A 1 in 7,000,000 chance in life's lottery. My prize? Guillain-Barre syndrome. It would be almost a year before I could walk again, four years before the last of the braces became unnecessary.

No more 'life as I knew it.' Goodbye football, pick-up games, hanging out with friends, weekend adventures, girls (no one really wants to hang out with a tin man). While my twin brother disappeared with friends, after school activities and weekend escapades, I stayed home, escaping into books. And quickly, movies. My parents found it more convenient to drop me off at Saturday's double-feature and assorted short subjects rather than try and keep me occupied at home.

My weekends were quickly filled with choices - space aliens (*The Day the Earth Stood Still* – still one of my favorites) and insect mutations (yuck, and they were so badly done), monster movies (*Godzilla* was cool... the first time), horror films (the decade of Hammer Films and Christopher Lee – classics), romantic comedies and dramas (never mind, I'd rather stay home) and Westerns. (what 13 year old could resist an afternoon filled with guns, shoot outs, heroes and villains, awesome scenery and great stories)? With three downtown movie houses (in a city of 29,000) there were lots of choices of first and second run movies.

Give me a large size soda, buttered popcorn and juicy fruits, and I was set for an afternoon with Major Dundee, Liberty Valance, Davy Crocket, Jim Bowie, Blondie... This was a great decade for westerns with directors like Sergio Leone (*The Good, The Bad, The Ugh*), John Ford (*The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance* and *How the West Was Won*), John Sturges (*The Magnificent Seven*), Sam Peckinpah (*The Wild Bunch, Ride the High Country*); films that have stood the test of time and the fickle nature of audiences. I wanted heroes and wide open spaces. I ached for danger, high drama, great chase scenes and life and death adventures ... anything to take me away from the dreariness of the here and now. I wanted to escape and I did. I also learned lessons about the importance of honesty and integrity; about racial equality, one's responsibility to community; the stark line between right and wrong, and that violence rarely solves anything.

Most of all, I learned that great stories and great storytelling held powerful magic. These characters faced life-changing decisions, had to choose between good and evil, overcome powerful obstacles to get what they wanted. This was all great theater. It still is. You don't find many stage westerns these days. When offered the opportunity to direct *Liberly Valance* it was impossible to say no. British playwright Jethro Compton's play is less a retelling of the film and more a fresh, engrossing and powerful new look at the myths I grew up with. The characters are complex, shaded in subtle hues of grey. Heroes aren't always good, villains may not be as bad as others assume. There is a cost we must pay for progress and change, and that progress can be a double-edged sword.

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
