BEN GOLDEN, who with his wife, is new to our stage, has come recently from extensive work with experimental theaters in New York; he has played with the Provincetown Theater, and with the Jameses in the Seattle Repertory. Perhaps the most interesting feature of Mr. Golden's theatrical background is the privilege he had of working for a year under Stanislavsky of the Moscow Art Theater.

ANN GORDON, director, is one of those tiny people who spark with talent in inverse proportion to their size. She has an English, Scottish and Canadian professional background, besides many years with Little Theater here and elsewhere. Ann and Jack met on the stage in Edinburgh and have trouped together for, lo, these many years.

## WHY A MANUSCRIPT PLAY?

Little Theaters exist primarily for experimental work, that is, to discover and develop those phases of drama which are neglected by the Commercial Theater for box-office reasons. The manuscript play thus becomes a vital feature of Little Theater work because it encourages American writers to do their utmost in drama writing, knowing that they may find audiences to test their work. Only in this way will a fine body of American dramatic writing be developed.
