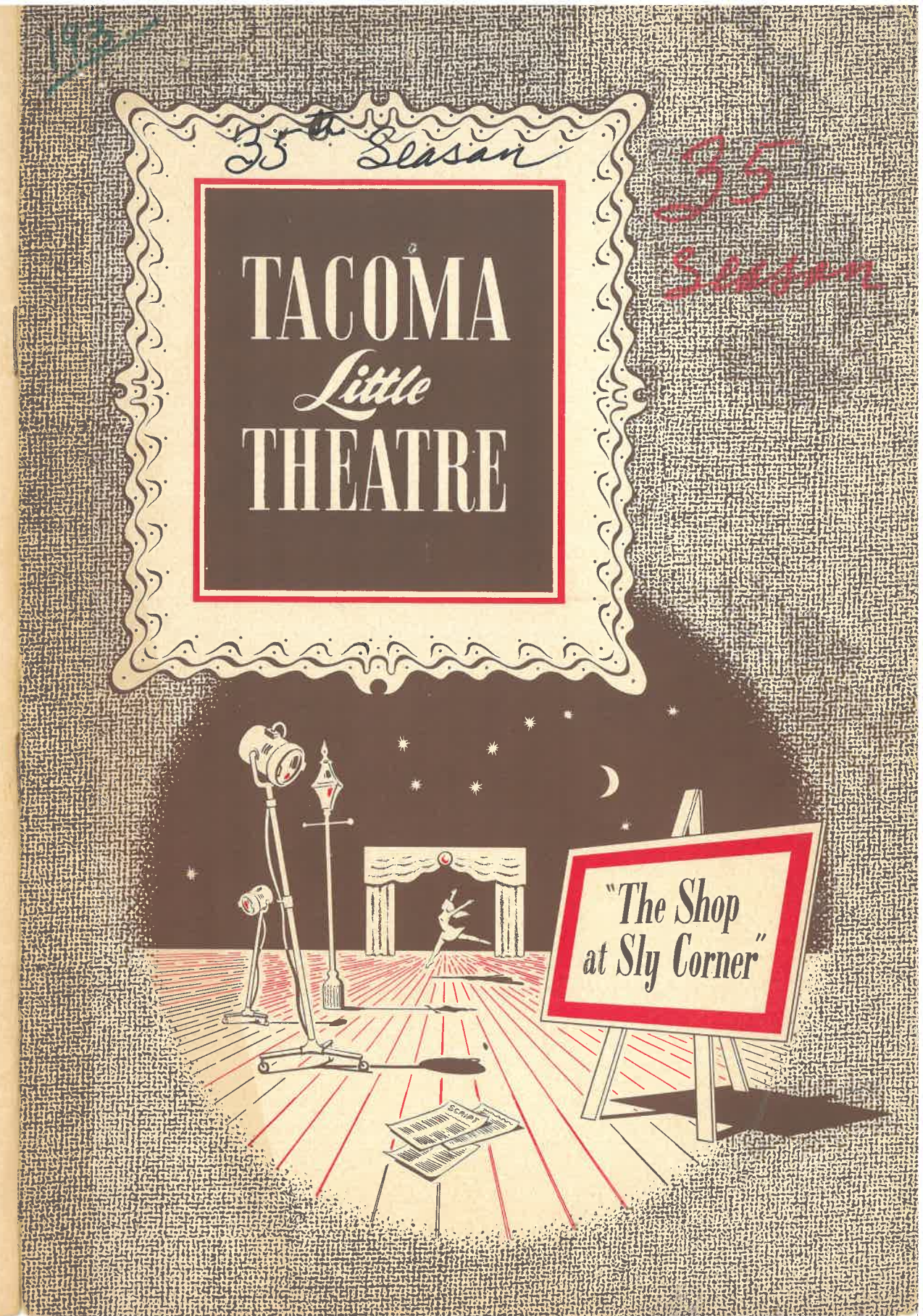

The sacrifices made by the thespians, be they professional or amateur, are numerous and varied. But few can cope with the unusual happenings as can **Nadine Gjertsen**. Three days before dress rehearsal, Directors Spier and Odlin were without an ingenue. The cast, in unison, said "We want Nadine", and within an hour Nadine was on the set. So, audience, our "wonder girl" is Nadine Gjertsen.

Although the demands of a busy law practice keeps him very busy, **Alvin Anderson** manages to find the time to indulge in his favorite hobby—acting. A comparative newcomer to Tacoma, he lost no time getting into dramatics again, his first appearance in Little Theater plays having been in "First Lady." The stage is not new to Anderson, for while a student at the University of Michigan Law School he appeared in many plays including "Valley Forge," "Macbeth" and "Journey to Jerusalem."

Uncle Sam's gain is going to be a great loss to the Little Theater when **Len Holton** answers the call to duty in January. Len has just finished at the College of Puget Sound where he took part in many of the dramatic productions there. In addition to these school activities he has lent his talents to many community efforts such as teaching children's theater for the Theater Guild as well as appearing in some of their plays. However, the Tacoma Little Theater claims him as its own due to his many appearances on its stage. He will be remembered for his roles in "Good News," "Belvedere" and several of the olios of the annual melodramas.

Although **Margot Seeley** has only once before indulged her burning desire to act, she comes by her talents naturally, for her father was an actor with the Grand Opera of Paris. Having diverted her many talents in other artistic fields, she eventually succumbed to her suppressed desire for the stage and made her first appearance on the Tacoma, or any other stage last year when she played in "The Two Mrs. Carrolls." Where and how she manages to find the time for this extra-curricular activity is nothing short of amazing, for in addition to caring for a large home and raising three daughters she is art instructor at the Seminary and a member of the Arts for Youth Council.

Rollin Guernsey's claim that "the least said about him—the better" may or may not be true, for according to the record he has expended considerable effort in behalf of the Tacoma Little Theater during the past few years. Not only has he performed in several plays, but he has also accepted the call to duty in the unsung, unheralded ranks of house-manager chores, ticket selling and various drives. In the line of dramatics he has performed on this stage in "Room

Service," "The Tavern" and "First Lady" to mention a few.

In spite of the fact that **Dan Seymour** claims he has not been interested in dramatics, he will find most of the Little Theater goes hard to convince, for he is rapidly becoming a familiar figure on the local stage. His performances in "Three Blind Mice" and "The Two Mrs. Carrolls" will be happily remembered by all who saw the plays, and he is chalking up another part in the current play in his role as detective inspector of Scotland Yard.

Isabel Hovel makes her first appearance on the Tacoma Little Theater stage this month with her performance as "Mrs. Catt." Although she professes to have had no dramatic experience prior to this, she has nevertheless performed by proxy, for her outside interests have been devoted to puppetry for a number of years. Her puppet shows are familiar to children throughout the city—having been produced in the schools through the P.-T.A. as well as the Y.W.C.A. and Occupational Therapy workshop.

A biographical introduction to **Wallace Scott** seems superfluous, so strictly for the benefit of new recruits to the Little Theater audience this paragraph is offered.

Wally's dramatic career began in college, and since then he has been active in all amateur theatrical groups in the community. His performances have been so numerous and varied that he is not sure just how many he has given, but hazards a guess that this will make his twenty-ninth. Included among the still-growing list of plays in which he has acted are "All Through the Night," "Goodbye My Fancy," "First Lady" and "Belvedere." His leading role in the current play is that of an Alsatian Frenchman who is an antique dealer in England.

Just exactly where and how **Betty Fyke** manages to squeeze Little Theater work into her day is hard to figure, but this is not the first time that she has loaned her talents to this stage. She has taken a part in three of the L.T. melodramas, and was also cast in the play "Janie." In addition to a full-time job at the Bank of Washington, Betty is studying voice at C.P.S. and is a junior hostess at the U.S.O. where she has sung frequently.

Although chemical engineering seems a far cry from dramatics, that is what **Tom Coleman** plans to study when he enrolls at Seattle College next year. However, amateur theatricals will undoubtedly remain first in his list of hobbies if his Little Theater activities are any indication. Tom has appeared in two plays here prior to his current performance, having taken parts in both "Good News" and "Command Decision." He is presently attending Bellarmine High School and will graduate this June.
