

He's a professional radio and advertising man lending his talents in two directions to help promote the T.L.T. Acting and "executing" are his long suits. He's immediate past president of the T.L.T. Ted's the first in his family to strike out for the floodlights. But Joan, his II-yearold daughter, is hoping to walk in her pop's steps. She's in the T.L.T.'s children's theatre classes just waiting for a chance to strut her stuff.

David Morris-Dave came out of the T.L.T. foyer and onto the stage in "Detective Story." For years he and Mrs. Morris have been foyer host and hostess. "But Helen Weed talked me into tryouts. I did and love it," he says. Dave was a lieutenant in "Detective Story," his first attempt at acting. His second show finds him as Byron Winkler, a politician and the secretary of state in "Affairs of State." "I like to see community efforts thrive. That's why I like being part of the grease paint brigade." The two Morris daughters, Mary Alice and Shirley Ann, are students. Mary Alice is a co-ed at W.S.C. Shirley is at Stadium. "But neither of them take to acting "he sighs.

Virginia has spent 15 years doing the sublime to the ridiculous in T.L.T. offerings. "I've played nearly every type role from ingenue to tramp." "Affairs of State" finds her a clothes horse. She's the 40-year-old Constance Russell—a bit of Perle Mesta in this production. Virginia is the Washington hostess with the mostest on the ball. In this show, she's a high brow sophisticate. Virginia can be counted upon to do a splendid job on or off stage. "Detective Story" was her most recent piece. She's headed committees and served on the T.L.T. board for eight years. Formally trained at the U. of W. drama school, Virginia also studied at the Ruth Radford Treatrical School. The theatre is her meat and love for it is her reason why. She's a housewife and mother of three children. "But I'm the only one who takes to drama like a jet to the skies. My husband, Harold, is strictly a spectator.'

Sheila Varey—A direct descendant of the screen star Lon Chaney, Sheila comes to the T.L.T. steeped in the traditions of the theatre. She's been in Tacoma only two years and her presence has been felt with showgoers since her debut in "The Silver Whistle." "I wanted to do more shows but the stork got first billing," she says. In "Affairs of State," Sheila plays Irene Elliott, a Celeste Holme type. A long string of theatrical accomplishments trailed

her from Seattle to Dallas to Albuquerque to Tacoma. She majored in drama at the U. of W. and followed through with roles in the Penthouse and Showboat theatres. Dallas and Albuquerque little theatres found her a trouper of the first degree. Lucky for Tacoma that her engineer-husband, Ted, migrated to these parts. "I want to get him interested in acting, too," the thespian vows. With heritage stemming from Lon Chaney, the Varey children, Danny and Beth, undoubtedly will vie for T.L.T. fame.

Colonel Arthur Simpson—The retired infantry colonel funnels his talents into the role of Lawrence the butler in "Affairs of State." The 65-year-old military man had minor roles in two T.L.T. productions, "Goodbye My Fancy" and a summer oleo scene—"Casey At The Bat." The Lakewood Players latched onto him for a repeater of his role in its production "Fancy." The colonel comes by his flair for the theatre naturally. His mother was popular in amateur productions. "She did some writing too." The colonel in retirement is the champion of the Golden Age clubs. "Building up the clubs for the golden years groups is one of my hobbies. We now have four of 'em in Tacoma. I like the theatre too. Dick Odlin is a theatrical genius and each of us should jump in and do our bit," he pleads.
