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

SP. 3 BRUCE MARTIN (Hassi) is from Columbus, Ohio. This is his first experience





# In Memory of Dick

Many of you have wondered and many have asked "What is to be done to perpetuate the memory of Dick Odlin—beloved Director of the Tacoma Little Theatre for the past five years?"

We of the Tacoma Little Theatre, mindful of his hosts of friends and admirers from every walk of life, wanted his Memorial to be one in keeping with an individualist who lived and breathed theatre to the end, and we have given careful thought to the question.

A bronze plaque was not the answer for Dick who loved laughter and warm, beautiful, useful things. Not something inanimate and coldly formal; the desire was for something symbolic of the theatre he loved—something beautiful, yet with a practical function; something that might enhance future productions as well as add to the pleasure of you who are our audiences. The committee did not find the answer difficult.

Among a sizable list of improvements needed for our theatre, Dick himself was most desirous of just two—the widening of the proscenium arch to provide a more spacious acting area, and . . . a new curtain. The Board of Trustees is now laying plans to widen the arch during the summer. Dick's Memorial is to be, most appropriately, the new curtain.

Supplementing the curtain as a part of the Memorial, will be a handsome oil-tinted photograph of Dick in his favorite role as "Sakini" in "Teahouse of the August Moon." This picture—a gift to the theatre—is to be framed and permanently hung, with indirect lighting, on the bricked wall of the lobby to the left of the entrance.

A fund has been established known as the Dick Odlin Memorial Fund. You who would like to share in tribute to a man whose artistry brought joy and pleasure to so many, are invited to participate. You will find a Memorial table for this purpose in the lobby each evening during the run of "The Desert Song." Contributions also may be sent to the Theatre office, in the form of checks payable to the Dick Odlin Memorial. (Such contributions are deductible for income tax purposes.)

The widened arch and Memorial Curtain are to be ready for the opening show in the fall.
