WHO'S WHO

It is said the boss is always responsible for the attitude of any organization or group under him; in this case the credit for the cast of "The Gazebo" being one of the pleasantest and friendliest on record goes to John B. Culbertson. Fortunately for TLT, Mr. Culbertson (after some 20 years in the Army) decided he liked this area better than the many others to which he had been assigned by Uncle Sam. Mrs. Culbertson and the three children agreeing. Tacoma, or, rather, Lakewood, is now their home. Last year guest director — "The Heiress" and "Come Blow Your Horn" — this year he has accepted the fulltime job as Director. TLT is indeed fortunate to have this talented and experienced professional to direct the coming season and Tacoma can be happy that this city is so favorably known to service people as **the** place in which to retire.

Just when everyone was wondering who could be dug up to play the leading role of "Elliott Nash," a kindly Fate saw to it that Russell Horton was transfered to Fort Lewis. Mind you, he'd only arrived in the middle of August and expects to leave again some time in October, so if Fate didin't have a hand in it, who did? Of course there were a few intermediaries such as his boss in the Public Relations office, but then

Russell, it turns out, is a professional actor in TV and the movies and the list of roles he has had seems very long for a man as young as he looks. A graduate of UCLA—drama and music (Russ also plays the piano and composes and he has been signed to write the musical score for a film in the not too distant future)—he managed, after experience in several "little" playhouses, to become a real professional without undue difficulty or loss of time. Those of you who follow "Petticoat Junction" may recognize his as "Junior coat Junction" may recognize his as "Junior Hocker," suitor of one of the girls, and it was he who led the line in the "Junction Hop"—remember that episode and the fantastically catchy dance? He has also appeared in TV in the "Great Adventure" series, "Route 66," "Twilight Zone," "My Three Sons" and in two Disney movies: "The Misadventures of Merlin Jones" and "The Tiger Walks." Watch for him this fall as he will constant with Dan O'Harling. this fall, as he will co-star with Dan O'Herliny in the new series "Profiles in Courage," based on President Kennedy's book. (Special notice for young ladies: Russell is a bachelor.)

Broadway may have its husband and wife teams, but TLT has one, too. You will have noticed, probably, that "Harlow Evans" is being played by one Robert Evans and "Matilda" by Alida Evans; well, this is the team and it was last seen in "The Taming of the Shrew." Alida hasn't many other roles in her scrapbook being pretty busy of late in a real estate office and prior to that as the mother of two daughters both of whom are now married. Both girls are interested in the theatre, one very much so-takes right after her father, says Alida, though at present she is having her family and temporarily retired. The second daughter has two children; soon Robert and Alida will be grandparents for the fourth time—it seems to agree with them, what? Grandfather, or perhaps it would be better to say, Robert, teaches drama and speech at Stadium High School and has been more active of late with the Lakewood Players than with TLT. He was in "The Pleasure of His Company" and directed "Critic's Choice." Arriving in Tacoma at an early age Robert had his schooling here, graduating from Stadium High and UPS and then went on to the University of Southern California for a degree in drama. Alida is a native of Tacoma, graduated from UPS and is the restriction and the product. And where may for entirely a native product. And where, may this reporter ask, could a better quality screech be found than the local variety demonstrated by "Matilda"?

With such unexpected talent available for the male lead, it was fortunate indeed that Tacoma could almost match it with Margaret Zaferin for the part of "Nell Nash." After sending three boys to the Children's Theatre she decided fortunately for Tacoma audiences to try out herself. Loreen started life well, with parts in "Tovarich" and other plays while at Oregon State but after graduation (from pre-nursing) decided to forsake "the drama" to be a wife and mother. War

delayed the second half of her career but then Gregory, John R. and Brian appeared and are now in the 8th, 6th and 2nd grades respectively, plus Saturdays at the Children's Theatre, as noted, only right now just two of them attend, the third being otherwise occupied. Mr. Hansen is a recently retired CWO, having been last stationed at McChord as a supply officer. He is presently tearing down his old house in town and is about to build a summer place at Filucy Bay — I might add that the Hansen's live in still a third place with nothing torn off it as yet. Having traveled around as service families do, Loreen says she is happy to settle down and make more friends than was possible in her traveling career. This is not her first time in Tacoma, for the Hansen family was stationed here some years ago between stints in California and Alabama. Given the warm, friendly atmosphere that Loreen so generously gives out, both off stage and on, it should be no time at all before those many friends she wants will be right on hand.

This play is the fifth at TLT for Louis Talcott who takes the part of "Mr. Thorpe;" the others were "Annie Get Your Gun," "Show Boat," "Strange Bedfellows" and "Brigadoon." Louis began his life in the theatre with the Driftwood Players in Aberdeen where he first appeared in the chorus and later as "Judd" in "Oklahoma!". Originally from Minnesota, Louis was brought to Oregon by his parents when he was quite small, and he grew up there, attending Whitman College and Conservatory. (If you haven't heard him play the organ, you should — he is good. Too bad there does not seem to be parts needing this talent!) After war time service in the Army Air Corps, Louis came back to the Northwest and eventually drifted into the Driftwood Players, as noted. He presently exercises his musical skills not only in playing organs but in singing in the choir at Mason Methodist Church and with the Totemaires which, it seems, is, or is part of, the Tacoma Chapter of SPEBSQSA. A Bostonian, he was watching rehearsals one day at the Boston Tributary Theatre; a few suggestions resulted in his acting and directing for some four years there, and with the Children's Theatre, affiliated with the Tributory Theatre, for over nine years. He also served as Director for the Boston YMCA's Little Theatre (and designed and painted the stage sets) for three seasons — all these jobs overlapping a bit. On being transfered to California he played "Judge Gaffney" in "Harvey" at the "King DoDo Playhouse" in San Jose and now, fortunately for TLT, he is settled in Tacoma. He says he spends his week days at the Social Security office, his evenings mostly at TLT and weekends he likes to explore Seattle's theatres, art galleries and scenery in general. (Girls, here's another bachelor.)

Paul Paulino — "Louie" — is another local product; attending Tacoma schools (he played the leading role in "Mr. Van Dyke" in junior high) and then Stadium where he was a student in Mr. Evans' dramatic classes. Not an unusual biography but none of us is ever all usual, and color and drama can be found beneath a surface of quiet competance.
