WHO'S WHO

ROBERT RINER (Bob)—Slim, energetic appearing "Bob" is a natural for this type casting. Mixing an Alka-Seltzer in a cup and watching it fizz between questions and answers, and explaining that he felt like he was getting the flu, he told of his theatre experience from the southern border to the northern border. Starting at Los Angeles, then to Arizona State College at Flagstaff, where he received his degree in education, he has played many parts on the stage. Finally to the Pacific Northwest as an English elementary teacher at Edgemont. He said that "acting" and "Theatre" are "first love," but "working is a necessity." Whether Bob is arrogantly striding across the stage, snuggling with "Tiffany," or fighting with "Mary," he realistically portrays the role of a frustrated young man who is trying to be very reasonable with an income of \$19,000 and expenditures of \$21,000 and the inevitable results. A board member and active in Fircrest Community Theatre, he directed "Hansel and Gretel," a children's play, last spring. He and his wife, Anita, have two children, four-year-old Andrea, and two-year-old Joel.

TLT is the third theatre for him, having given performances with Snohomish County Theatre in Everett, and at the University of Washington, where he took a six-month drama course. He has had parts in "Blithe Spirit," "Breath of Spring," "Mister Roberts," "Far Country" and "Solid Gold Cadillac." His wife, Lola, gives home-support for his theatre hobby along with Burke, student at Woodbrook Junior High School, Debra and Scott, who attend Heartwood Elementary School.

FRANK EMMETT (Dirk)—Tall, slender with a slow smile, Frank shows an eagerness to learn and gives rapt attentiveness to director John Culbertson's suggestions. His first role was judge in "Daughter of Silence." This newcomer to the theatre is a representative of the Western Shuffleboard Company, Tacoma manufacturer of shuffleboards. Perhaps this will become a theatre-oriented family if Frank's wife, Kathryn, begins to paint scenery.

DOROTHY JEAN HEFFERNAN (Mary)—Stage lights perform a bit of magic when Dorothy comes on the stage. She gives such a natural performance that it is almost glib . . . she knows her lines and her character part so well that the ready wit and quick responses really give depth and liven up the play. The audience should have a feeling of actually being there. She certainly has a feel for light comedy.

PAT COLLIER (Oscar)—With his ease of manner and gentle self-assurance Pat gives this role a perfect polish. Laugh-crinkles at the corners of his grey-green eyes show frequent

MARLENE MIKO (Tiffany)—The name describes this character part perfectly and it is charmingly being played by a brand new theatre enthusiast in her second play. Her first role was in "Love From a Stranger." TLT rehearsal of "The Rainmaker" brought anything but clouds into Marlene's life. She attended with a friend and received her first introduction to a "live" stage production, and met Keith Bennett. (They are engaged with the wedding date set for 11th of September.) This dark-haired, dark-eyed, 21-year-old Tacoman gives an unassuming air as she soaks up suggestions like a sponge on improvements of her performance. Perhaps she will be a regular TLT performer in years to come. The talent is there.

"The Community Theatre and How It Works"

By John Wray Young, Managing Director, Shreveport, La.

(Excerpts from Mr. Young's book)

* * *

"... Today the American community theatre does most of our country's play production.

* * *

"... If you have to depend on the casual ticket-buyer, your situation is not safe or happy, for he does not trust your theatre, or your taste, or your ability, enough to buy a season ticket and try the whole season.

* * *

"... When a playwright writes a play so obtuse that only one or two profess to understand it, he has written himself out of the theatre.

* * *

"... What the producer may not know is that what is right for Broadway may be entirely wrong for the civic playhouse.

* * *

"... It is wise to choose plays which will not risk offending the moral standards of the average man and his family. If the play contains language or situations which they find shocking, they are not likely to return.

* * *

"... Bohemianism will not do. There are a good many towns which no longer have theatres because they did not understand this.

* * *

"... If community theatre workers do not enjoy their work they are not apt to return.

* * *

"... To build team spirit with volunteer players is difficult, but it has to happen if the organization is to progress.

* * *

"... An audience would rather see a play that is new to them by a PROVEN WRITER than an UNPROVEN WORK by an UNPROVEN PLAYWRIGHT.

* * *

"... Balance and variety are needed through five to eight plays.

* * *

"... Acquiring top civic leaders for board service is tempered with one restriction: They must be workers on a working board.

* * *

"... Today the American community theatre involves a greater total number of participants than have ever worked in an art form, in any nation, in all of history."
