"WHO'S WHO"

By Dorothy M. Clark

The story of "SOUTH PACIFIC" is a bitterly beautiful commentary on human relationships and the artificial standards that civilization has imposed upon them. Desperately contradicting the colorful, peaceful, tropical setting with its seething and heart breaking recounting of love and prejudice, this is a musical with a profound message for us all. It will hopefully inspire the audience to reexamine those values which we have been "carefully taught." Perhaps through the tears we shed for the characters caught up in this tragic situation, we can visualize SOME ENCHANTED EVENING when humanity will find its maturity. Listen, then, with your heart wide open, to the raucous laughter of the men who can not cry because it hurts too much, to the hauntingly wistful songs of the Emiles and the Cables: there is perhaps less time left for the world than there was for the Lieutenant, and as the sadness of his romance unfolds, it becomes increasingly clear that a second chance is not always possible.

MILTON THOMPSON and BILLIE KENNEDY, two performers dearly beloved by their associates, recreated the roles of Emile and Nellie. Eight years ago, this was Billie's first attempt at a dramatic role. Since then she has won a Dickie for her performance in "Far Country." Milt and Billie project a warm and loving sincerity that makes their portrayals a privilege to witness.

RICHARD and KAREN HOOPER, husband and wife for 10 months, have found that being cast as Emile and Nellie has some disadvantages. Each one has become the others most unrelenting critic. Dick is a State parole and probation officer working in the Seattle Central Area. He met Karen when she was a 17 year old folk singer entertaining in his coffee house in Olympia. They are deeply impressed with the moral message of this musical, and hope that their performances may in some way contribute to understanding between people. It is their feeling that attention should be directed away from them as artists and toward the poignant plea of the story for a better world for us all.

BOB SWANSON (Lt. Cable) insists that his wife is his stablizing influence, studies voice with Ivan Rasmussen, leads a dance band that plays blues and jazz, teaches music in Sumner and likes to fish. Sounds pretty All-Northwestern American! He has enjoyed most the chance to do a dramatic part.

AL PHILLIPS, who plays Lt. Cable, alternating with Bob, is something special in this world, I think. He likes teen-agers. How about that! His wife, an active Clef Dweller, convinced him that he should audition for this role, and he is glad she did. Al, belying his youthful appearance, has three children, 12, 13, and 14 years of age. He once worked with Billie Kennedy in Brigadoon, way back in his high school days.

"WHO'S WHO" (Continued)

ANDREE HAYES and GAIL COBLENTZ, indeed "Younger than Springtime" are they. With the quiet freshness of April showers, they appear in the role of Liat who speaks to us with the poetry of youth. This is a difficult part to do because there are almost no words used to express the deep feelings of love and its tragic ending. Andree is 21 years old, this is her first experience on stage. Gail has danced with the Tacoma Concert Group, the Civic Ballet and last summer won a Joffrey scholarship.

Is the plural of Billis, Billi, or just plain Billises? Well, anyway, we have two of them, working away at conning their fellow service men, trading insults with Bloody Mary, and doing sweet little favors for your favorite and mine, Nellie Forbush. PAT CHAPMAN is the most versatile of all comedians who entertain at TLT. He has appeared in this hilarious role before and improves each time we see him. There is a professional perfectionism about Pat that makes him a delight to work with. He has directed several plays at Lakewood and appeared last winter at the Cirque in Seattle. DUNCAN MacLEAN, asked that only two lines be written about him, so here they are. Dunc is the most, has done the whole bit in theatre, comedy, drama, back stage, owns a poodle, appeared at Lakewood and the Cirque and is the best cook whose food I have ever eaten.

PERSIS SHOOK, who sings like an angel but is much more interesting than any of the others I have known, and Zoanne Willkie, who is no relation to Wendell, will give you goose-bumps when they sing Bali-Hi; their invitation to "come with me to that special island" is difficult to resist. The eldest Shook son is about to be married, the next one is in college, the teen-age daughter is a cheer leader, and there are two little fellers still in grade school. Persis still finds time to teach music. Her talent and time have been generously contributed to TLT for the last 15 years.
