





"WHO'S WHO"

Dorothy M. Clark

Walk with me through the backstage and on stage areas, meet the people, and share some of my observations of the development of this musical.

One night I found Peter and Diane Allen and their five year old son painting on the backdrop, which they designed. They are gentle souls, concerned with beauty in all its aspects... dedicated to achieving artistic experiences in a variety of fields. This is their first theatre venture. There is a soft kindness in their treatment of their fellow human beings and especially in their relationship with the many children in the cast. Peter and Diane are recent arrivals from the Los Angeles Area where they studied art at Choinard's Art Institute. They are actively involved in the non-violent protest ideology.

On stage was Susan Sandegren, intense young Republican, teaching the oriental dance steps to some of the chorus members. Susan comes from a traditionally politically oriented family . . . two of her uncles were well known in the Tacoma area. She has been an airline stewardess, lived in Europe, likes to ski, works for the proseucting attorney and is fascinated with things pertaining to the law. She is determined that her voice as a younger voter shall be heard.

Beverly Haverly, the wizard of the needlework set, arrived with a bundle of gorgeous sparkley costumes slung over her back. Bev deserves our applause for her tireless effort to dress the singers in appropriately authentic costumes. She has designed and constructed all but a few of the clothes used tonight, and has done so mostly without help. Packing another armload of Satin and Silk was Bev's young son, Jonn, the last of the Haverly kids, all of whom have entertained Tacoma Audiences with their music. Jonn is cast as the Young King, playing the role every night. He attends Junior High School . . . says he is about average in ability to get grades. He hopes to learn everything there is to know about theatre.

An experience of pure delight is to spend a few minutes with Carol Hazelrigg and her two daughters, Susan and Peggy. They are so involved with the enjoyment of living and doing—so aware of the "little things"—so direct and forthright in expressing themselves. All three sing with the chorus and the two girls dance in the Uncle Tom sequence. (Secret: Peggy is in love with the Hazelrigg puppy.)

Found the Girolami family, all six of them, busy with many projects. Mother, Joanne was helping some of the cast with lines; the four older children were busy on stage. Doing what? Being children. And the little guy, 2½ years old, was stretched out on someone's coat in the lobby taking his pre-entrance nap. The Girolami family does just about everything together with zest and vigor . . . is active in sports, scouts, music, has a dog, five cats, an aquarium full of fish, 8 frogs, a salamander and a robin with an injured leg. Meet the Girolamis . . . Joanne, Frank, Tracy, Philip, Mark and little Vincent.

Taking a somewhat apprehensive tour through the clutter backstage, I was startled by a genuine monster, leering and growling at me. Turned out to be a fake, though. It was Maureen Smith, aged about 9 long years, wearing one of the masks that she and her sister, Lynne had constructed out of paper mache in the basement of their home. These are the masks worn by the dancers in the show.

And also on hand with his special kind of charm is veteran performer and beloved friend, Louis Talcott, this time playing the role of Captain Orton. Louis' happiest moments are spent here at TLT, and we always know that a play will be a success because Louis says it will.

"WHO'S WHO" (Continued)

Boys are surely fun to talk to. **Ted Reinert** and **Mike Finn**, a couple of pre-teen guys, cast as **Louie** discuss most anything from soccer to philosophy. Ted likes things ranging from the Beattles to Oliver Twist, reads a lot, would like to be an actor. He is very knowledgeable about protest marches and sympathetic to the cause. Mike, who doesn't mind being called Mickey Finn, plays the guitar and trumpet, and like Ted, is interested in a theatrical career. Mike is a superior student, but claims he is pretty modest about it.

Mr. and Mrs. Richard Hooper (Dick and Karen, actually) are appearing together for the second time in a TLT musical. We met them during South Pacific last year. The Hoopers are young, intelligent, versatilly talented . . . but more than that they are very concerned individuals who work hard for the causes of peace and love. They have been involved in the non-violent peace protests, work with disadvantaged children in Seattle's Central area, are discouraged with the state of the world, but continue to be involved in its betterment. Dick has a Master's Degree in Sociology . . . he and Karen enjoy folk singing. Dick really identifies with the character he is playing, the King, with his frustrations and his confusion about moral concepts. Karen is seen as Tuptim.

Alternating with Dick in the role of the King, is Douglas W. Pulse, who got into the act a little later than the rest of the cast. He started rehearsing two weeks before opening night, but had done the role before in Olympia. Doug has been in the army for seven years, recently returning from VietNam where he performed for Special Services. He sang in Olympia for the Governor, was a mmber of the Heinrich Schuz choir in Heilbronn, Germany. He is less than 30 years old, has a wife and 8 month old son, does not believe in the generation gap.

Audiences at TLT have long enjoyed and admired the meticulous performances of Dagney Vaswig, tonite appearing as Anna. She accomplishes perfection through conscientious devotion to detail and her feeling of responsibility to an audience. We who love Dagney have mourned with her the untimely death of her daughter, Pauline, an airline stewardess, who died last year in an aircraft accident. Pauline shared her Mother's happiest times here at the theatre. Now she is somewhere else watching, and we miss her.
