

Statistics show that most community theatres throughout the country lose from 20 to 30 percent of their season ticket subscribers each year. Usually this drop is replaced by about the same number of new subscribers — if the theatre is good and consistently presents good plays. This amounts to 400 to 500 loss of subscribers per year. TLT hopes to gain all of these loses back plus a few more.

TLT has an annual operating cost of about \$30,000 per year. So with a loss of 20 to 30 percent each year, it means that the theatre is short of meeting expenses, which can be only met in one way: raise the price of tickets. THIS WE DO NOT WANT TO DO. And, this can be avoided with YOUR HELP to get new subscribers.

Where else in Tacoma can you get SEVEN EVENINGS OF GOOD ENTERTAINMENT for what it costs you to be a subscriber at the Tacoma Little Theatre?


