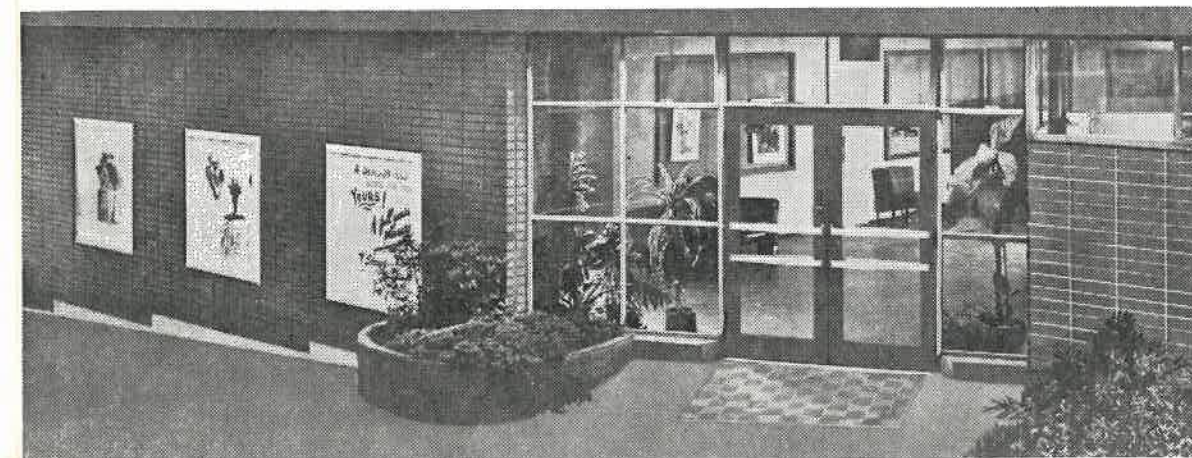

"WHO'S WHO"

LINDA CHAPMAN (Ann Stanley) . . . While a new face to TLT audiences, Linda is by no means a stranger to the theater. She has worked extensively on several productions at TLT, Lakewood Players, and Steve's Gay 90's as properties master, set decorator, painter, assistant stage manager and coffee maker. Linda attended WSU, MIT, and UPS. She is now the only woman that is an Environmental Health Specialist for the city of Tacoma. In her spare time, she enjoys motorcycle racing and camping with her husband and their six children.

BILL CROSBY (Peter Latham) . . . Bill is a graduate of CWSC, where he received a B.A. in Education while majoring in Music. Since that time, all his efforts have been toward a career in professional theatre. Bill helped form "The Haymarket Theatre" and has been involved as a performer and musical director in numerous other shows. He stepped into this role just a week before opening and proves he has what it takes to be a pro. TLT audiences saw Bill last in "Hello Dolly."

LORRAINE HILDEBRAND (Mrs. Adams) . . . Lorraine comes to TLT by way of TCC's "My Partner" in which she played Polly in her stage debut. A real pioneer at TCC, "Hildy" was there before "they had toilets." She is still at TCC where she works as the Reference Assistant and Bibliographer in the library. Hildy loves to fish, cook, knit, and crochet, in that order. Her five children claim she makes the greatest lasagna and French bread.

DOLORES HAYS (Mrs. Margolin) . . . This is Dolores' second production at TLT. Remember Emily Bach-Nielsen in "Beekman Place?" A native Tacoman, Dolores spent three years in Europe and three years in the Philippines during her husband's tour of duty. Dolores studied drama at WSU and kept her hand in, wherever she went. An avid bridge player, Dolores enjoys reading and of course the theatre.

TOM BIRKELAND (Billy Boylan) . . . TLT audiences will recall Tom's many credits over the past nine years probably better than he will. His role in "A Thousand Clowns" is his favorite, but we have enjoyed his talents in many more shows; "Harvey," "Critic's Choice," "Music Man," and "Hello Dolly," just to mention a few. Presently Tom manages the Hardy Shoe Store at the Tacoma Mall and is collaborating on a musical with a good friend. Tom studied at Central Washington State College and spent some time at Laguna Beach.

JOHN THUN (Eddy Edwards) . . . This is John's first appearance at TLT. It is John's second role on stage, the first one was in "Poor Richard." He has worked backstage on other plays. John spends his spare time running, and, recently won first place for the two-mile and quarter-mile. He, also, plays tennis, enjoys building log cabins and making hand split shakes himself.

HERMIONE ANDERSON (Maud Hayes) . . . Hermie's list of credits at TLT are long and impressive. She has won two Dicky awards, one for "Warm Peninsula" and one for "Love from a Stranger." Her last appearance at TLT was in "Plaza Suite." Hermie is the librarian at St. Joseph Hospital, and her husband is a sales representative for Acoustical Design.

BOB and ALIDA EVANS (Mr. and Mrs. Latham) . . . It isn't very often that a husband and wife get to play a husband and wife on stage, but in the case of Bob and Alida it's a first. Although they have appeared in many shows together, including "Dinner at Eight," "Suds in Your Eyes," and "The Taming of the Shrew," they have never been mates. Bob was going to give up the theatre after his last show but he is back again, much to the delight of TLT audiences.

ALAN and ANITA COWAN (Trina Stanley and Patrick Graham) . . . Another husband and wife team, Alan and Anita bring with them a number of credits. Often seen at Steve's Gay 90's, they are well versed in melodrama. Anita has appeared at TLT only once before in "Don't Drink the Water." This is Alan's premier before TLT audiences. For all of you who are wondering, Alan is 6 foot 6 and 3/4 inches tall.

MICHAEL S. RIPKA . . . Director and Technical Director. You may, possibly, remember "Mike" as Sgt. Trotter in last season's production of "The Mousetrap." If you do, you know he knows his way around stage. This season he has decided to put his talents to work behind the scenes. His credits are numerous, and you'll be seeing a lot of his work on future productions.


