Mike Minor (Henry Higgins) will be remembered by TLT theatregoers for his sensitive portrayal of Allan in "Picnic" — a far cry from his Shavian interpretation of Henry Higgins. "This role is a challenge" states Mike, "but I've learned self-discipline and it's been a great help in my approach to playing it." The Jason Lee English teacher loves Shaw and has developed Higgins with what he saw in Shaw. He had no difficulty acquiring an English accent with previous roles in "Charley's Aunt" and "The Importance of Being Earnest." This summer Mike will be going to London and it is particularly exciting to him as he will be seeing the places he speaks of in the show. Thanks to Mike's creativity and polish, Henry Higgins is the ageless gentleman he should always be.

Stephanie Phillips (Eliza Doolittle) is everyone's fair lady having delighted viewers for five years with her vivacity and capability to communicate with an audience. A natural for Eliza with her unique talent for dialects, this Foss senior has been busy this year taking jazz dance, playing roles in "Hansel & Gretel" and "Down In the Valley" and as a candidate in the "Miss Pierce County" contest. TLT'ers have seen Stef in "Gypsy", "Halfway Up the Tree" and "Hello, Dolly" and will probably be noted for her versatility in handling 3 different types of characters. 

She feels they really have fun with what they are doing and this good natured lady obviously does, too. Obtaining a degree from Oklahoma State University in Interior Design, Maxine now works as a graphic artist for the Pierce County Library. Her favorite activity is backpacking and hiking with the Mountaineers, and we hope she will add the stage as a new outlet.

Earl Edgil (Jamie) a fun loving fellow, has been away from the theatre for 12 years. He's an import from Florida and decided to move to Washington because he loves the outdoors and all the activities connected with it. He promptly joined the New Sound Singers, which, he claims, takes up most of his time. Earl is a ticket agent for Eastern Airlines at Ft. Lewis. His natural wit was showing when he told of his being type cast in this role with all three of his entrances showing him falling out of a bar.

John Miller (Harry) makes his second appearance at TLT having previously been seen in "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" John attended Calvin College in Grand Rapids, Michigan, and is employed at Pacific National Auto Parts. This shy, reserved young man enjoys motorcycling and skin diving. Of "My Fair Lady", his first musical in 10 years of theatrics, John says: "It's the only play I've been in where I could learn my lines in 5 minutes."
