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
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UPCOMING SHOWS

INTRODUCING: THE DIRECTORS

DIRECTOR ARLENE HANSON loves the theatre- and that's a good characteristic for a director to have! She first came to TLT "many years ago" to audition for "The Women," and this play marks her return to us. In the meantime, Arlene has been busy being school secretary for Whitman Elementary School - and doing a lot of directing for the Asbury Players of Asbury Methodist Church. For them, Arlene has directed "Our Town," "You Can't Take It With You," "The Man Who Came To Dinner," "The Land Is Bright," "Night of January 16th," "Harvey" and "Heaven Can Wait!" For "Heaven," Arlene has the highest regard. She calls it a "priceless" play and claims that "there is not one line that is not perfection itself." We hope our audience will agree!

TOM DAVIDSON is wearing two hats during this production - that of ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR and the star of the show, JOE PENDLETON. This engaging man has nothing to do with boxing in real life - though you wouldn't know it from watching him on stage. Formerly a teacher for Tacoma Public Schools, Tom is now at Bayview Mobile Homes. Both TLT and the Asbury Players have been lucky enough to borrow some of Tom's talents. At TLT, he has appeared in "The Odd Couple" and "Mary, Mary." He also *directed* our production of "Arsenic and Old Lace." Asbury Players grabbed him for "The Land Is Bright," "Night of January 16th" - and *their* production of "Heaven Can Wait."

AN HONORABLE MENTION

To CY HANSON, being involved as SET DESIGNER AND CONSTRUCTION CREW with this production means that "I get along well with my wife." (He'd better - everybody knows that you don't argue with the director!) He is a man with an exceptional background in and knowledge of the theatre; the type of man you could listen to for hours. Cy was a Lieutenant with the Tacoma Police Department and has served as Stage Manager for both Lincoln High School and U.P.S. Now he says he is fully retired, just doing odd construction jobs for friends. We sure hope that Cy counts TLT among his friends. . .!



INTRODUCING: THE CAST

Wm. ARTHUR PHILLIPS (MR. JORDAN) says that painting and art instruction, choral conducting and coaching and playing tennis are his "three basic secular interests." He is retired from teaching painting and art at Wilson High School, where he still serves as tennis coach. Not only that - but he also packs quite a whallop as an actor. Concentrating mostly on musicals, Mr. Phillips has appeared in "Carousel," "Oklahoma," "Brigadoon" and "Firefly" at TLT, among others. His non-musicals include "Harvey," "The Man Who Came To Dinner" and "Night of January 16th." And we're not finished yet with his list of credits; he also happens to write and direct musical parodies of operettas.

DAVID SIDES (MESSENGER 7013) just finished playing a man with an unusually keen interest in murderers in "The Bad Seed." His involvement with death takes a different turn in this play, however. This time he's having more fun; this time he likes the character he's playing because "he gets laughs!" Definitely a departure from David's earlier role. At first, it may seem that David is a bit egotistical, making comments such as "I never make mistakes." Yet a more humble side is revealed when he admits that playing Messenger 7013 is "probably the closest I'll ever get to heaven." A little harp music, please. . .

Will the real ROY TETER stand up? By day he is Captain Dispatcher for the Tacoma Fire Department. His hours? Some days are as long as the emergencies he must classify and assist in overcoming. By night, he is a creditable actor with the Asbury Players, and has been for the past five years. Roy played a character named "Tony" in two of their productions, "The Land Is Bright" and "The Man Who Came To Dinner." That coincidence may seem like just a coincidence - until you notice that the name of the person he portrays in this play is . . . you guessed it: TONY ABBOTT!!

KATHY PEELE confessed that she "at first found BETTE LOGAN to be a bit of a sap." She decided to look deeper into the character, and "soon discovered her more admirable qualities of compassion and fortitude with which I can identify." Like many other actors in this production, Kathy is a veteran of the Asbury Players, for whom she played Myrtle Mae Simmons in "Harvey" and the secretary in "The Land Is Bright." She is a social worker at the Pierce County Jail. If you go looking for her and she's not there, however, here's a clue to her whereabouts: "I can be found restoring our 75-year-old house - which is often mistaken for a demolition site."

Talent just runs in the Hanson family. No two ways about it! Cy and Arlene's daughter CHRISTINE HANSON (JULIA FARNSWORTH) would like to make a living acting. But for now (and for the past 12 years), she is a junior high school English-Journalism teacher, which doesn't sound too bad, either. And just because you think all English teachers are goody-goodies doesn't mean that is all there is to them. This true confession came to me written in Christine's own hand: "I love Julia's evilness! It's fun to play a role such as Julia, as I can express all my pent-up aggressions through her." And - dare I say it? - it even gets worse. When asked if she is anything like the character she portrays, Christine denies it, then adds: "Though there are times I wish I could be as openly snide as she is." I think I'd better stop here. . .

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ERIC ZEIGLER seems to have a running argument with the director. The actor who plays MAX LEVENE in this production will try to convince anyone who'll listen that he is not an actor. Our director counters with "Ha! He's too modest." He answers the question "Why are you an actor?" with "because the director made me." And, of course, "the director" is what (or who) brought him to TLT. To change the subject, Eric played the lead role, loveable Elwood P. Doud, in the Asbury Players production of "Harvey," directed by . . Arlene Hanson. (I tried.) In real life (apart from the director), Eric teaches sixth grade at Whitman Elementary School and coaches basketball at both Baker Junior High and the South End Boy's Club. (P.S.: TLT agrees with director Hanson - Eric, you are an actor!)

LEFTY is portrayed by JOHN HUBERT, who is a fifth grade teacher at Madison Elementary School. His credits include roles in six Asbury Players productions: "The Land Is Bright," "Heaven Can Wait," "The Night of January 16th," "The Man Who Came To Dinner," "You Can't Take It With You" and "Harvey."

BOB BEARDSLEY is a Captain (Inspector) with the Tacoma Fire Department. Other than that, we know almost nothing about him - except that he's a super nice guy and a member of the Runners Club at the YMCA. And that he is playing INSP. WILLIAMS (seems appropriate) in "Heaven Can Wait." The rest. . . will have to remain a mystery.

IRMA WRENN (MRS. AMES) works with handicapped children at Seward Elementary School. She, too,has an envialbelist of roles to her credit, including Mrs. Gibbs in "Our Town," Penny Sycamore in "You Can't Take It With You" and Veta Louise Simmons in "Harvey." Her favorite hobby is square and folk dancing, which she enjoys 2 to 3 times a week.

CATHERINE KELLY has something going for her that a lot of TLT aspiring actors and actresses don't have: the opportunity to write her own reviews! She and her brand-new husband Michael Kelly (who plays a Passenger in this production) are the reviewers for the Tacoma Community College school newspaper, Collegiate Challenge. Besides her current role as SUSIE, Catherine has appeared in the play "Lil' Abner."

SCARLETT McCANN (ANN) intends to make the theatre her life, and is confident that she can make it happen. She's got the right attitude for sucess as an actress; when asked what brought her to TLT she answered "ambition!" She appeared in several high school productions and sums up herself as an actress thusly: "Minimal experience, maximum desire." Scarlett works as a Medical secretary in the offices of Doctors Gross, Larsen and Whitney.

GARY CAMINITI isn't really a DOCTOR - but he could sure fool me! What he is, really, is a talented actor who has had roles in the following plays: "Shenandoah," "You Can't Take It With You," "The Brick Rose," "Oklahoma!," "Heaven Can Wait" and "Little Mary Sunshine." Gary has even been on television! He was in a short film segment for the popular "That's Incredible" show.

What does the DELIVERY MAN have in common with an art teacher and football coach? The name DENNIS HANSON, that's what! He does both of those things at Keithley Junior High School. At TLT (and elsewhere!), Dennisacts! He has appeared as Bart in "The Land Is Bright," and as the "G" Man in "You Can't Take It With You," among others. His hobby is bowling.

Despite his young age, COLIN DOLAN (PATROLMAN) has had roles in quite a few plays. He appeared in "Up the Down Staircase," "My Three Angels," "Night Watch" and "Taming of the Shrew" at Foss High School. The last two productions were under the direction of TLT Board Member and Recording Secretary Patty Steen. (Keep sending 'em, Patty!)

Playing the FIRST ESCORT is LINDA VAN RAVENSWAAY, who is well known to TLT audiences for her performances in "Mary, Mary" and "Seven Year Itch." Also a current

member and past President of Tacoma Little Theatre's Executive Board, Linda is Assistant to the Branch Manager of Xerox. Her five year-old son, Brock, is distinguishable as the smallest (and cutest!) of the Passengers in this production.

ELLEN MACREADY, who plays SECOND ESCORT, has played small parts in many shows, including part of the Chorus in "Antigone," Anna in "The Ivory Door," Kitchen Wench (there's a juicy one!) in "Once Upon a Mattress," Clown in "Circus Theatre," Young Girl in "Kiss Me," Charlotte in "Night of the Iguana," Marie in "My Three Angels" and Nurse in "Streetcar Named Desire." Ellen has also appeared in a show called "Conceiled Comedy," reenacting excerpts from "The Rivals" and "Love for Love."

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
