

MEET THE DIRECTOR

Anybody who's been around TLT at all the past year knows MARTIN LARSON. Junior Theatre instructor, director of last season's "By Strouse" and this season's "Bad Seed," this production (obviously!) and our upcoming spring musical, "Kiss Me Kate." Martin is one of the most talented and energetic people we know. He was doing similar work in theatre in California before moving up here. Martin has been planning to "someday" do a musical version of "A Christmas Carol" for seven years. And remember - he's not only the director, but the author of the script as well! So when he says "This show is a dream come true," you can believe it!

MEET THE MUSICAL DIRECTORS

WENDY NAPLIN came to Tacoma from Federal Way, which is not exactly a great distance. Luckily, her career has come a lot farther than the rest of her. Senior Piano major at the University of Puget Sound (UPS), Wendy plans to have a career as an accompanist, and is already on her way. She is currently Assistant Music Director for the Real World Players theatre group, and accompanies during classes at Jan Collum's School of Classical Ballet. Her credits include "My Fair Lady," "Fiddler On The Roof" and Ballet Tacoma's "Nutcracker." Her boyfriend let it slip that Wendy would also like to get involved in acting. Stick around TLT for a while, Wendy. . .

J. DIRK DAMONTE is only 23 years old, but he's certainly packed a lot of experience into those years. A Piano Performance Major at UPS, he was pianist for last year's "Side by Side by Sondheim." Another transplanted Californian, Dirk worked both as Pianist/Conductor for musical revues at Marriott's Great America and with Gene Patrick Productions as Pianist/ Assistant Musical Director for conventions, TV shows and commercial recordings. And in Chicago, Illinois, he was Assistant Musical Director/Pianist for "Country Music Time" last summer. After reading all that, his comment "Plan a future in musical theatre" seems anticlimactic!

MEET THE CAST

MARK JUSTAD (just like the rest of us) can only be a "nice guy" like BOB CRATCHIT for short periods at a time. This Music Theory and Composition senior at UPS says of the character he portrays "Bob can only see the good in everyone. Perhaps if more people were like him this world would be a nicer place." Mark played Tevye in "Fiddler On The Roof," Christ in "Godspell" and Feddie in "My Fair Lady" - all at Bothell High. Currently a member of both the Adelphian Concert Choir and the Madrigal Singers at UPS, he plans to make music the focal point of his life.

FRANCES RANKOS (Mrs. FEZZIWIG) has been singing since age 5 - and that love of music is what led her to the theatre and stage musicals. Besides acting and singing, she involves herself with hair design, makeup and costumes. But to Frances, a real dream come true would be performing in an opera. Totally different from the character of Mrs. Fezziwig, her real-life "role" is Information Operator for Pierce County Transit.

I had to ask DICK STORHOLT a loaded question. Are you anything like SCROOGE? "I guess I am. . . a little." But he's quick to remind me that "behind all the bluster, Scrooge is a big pussycat." It's a role Dick has always wanted to play, but he never dreamed it would be in a musical! His acting career began in high school and college, and at TLT he has played Jonathan in "Arsenic and Old Lace," the Inspector in "Dial M for Murder," Oscar (and "Director!") in "Mary, Mary" and Richard Bravo in "Bad Seed." And if I mentioned everything else Dick does around TLT, we'd be here all night. . .

DAVID JARMAN (FRED) read about the auditions for "Scrooge" in the paper, came "just to check it out" - and landed the part he wanted! (Life should always go so smoothly.) What was there about the character that drew him to it? "I am like Fred in some ways - easy-going, happy-go-lucky, a very friendly guy." Right now, David works at a bakery and counts skiing, backpacking and working on cars among his hobbies. Oh - and acting, of course. But(you know how it goes), he wouldn't mind making a career of acting, if only.

PAT WULICK played the murdering little girl, Rhoda, in this season's "Bad Seed." It was definitely a role that she enjoyed, and even identified with! Not so the character of KATHY. Pat complains, "She's a wimp and a goody-goody. I'm mouthier." The veteran of a school play or two as well as her parts at TLT, she told me earlier that she wanted to be in a musical, so that makes up for a less than beloved role this time around. This extremely talented girl spends her spare time dancing, singing and reading.

Speaking of Pat Wulick, she is the reason that brother DAN WULICK chose acting as his avocation. "My sister did it and it looked like fun." When he found out we were doing "Scrooge," he was on his way. And TINY TIM is a special role to Dan; a role he wanted very much to play. Though he describes himself as being "totally different" from Tiny Tim, he does think that it's a good part for him, "because he's spoiled." So now we know. . .being outspoken runs in the Wulick family!

Like David Jarman, THERESA HURRELL (PERSON OF CHARITY) saw our notice in the paper and decided to give us a try. (It sure pays to advertise!) The fact that we required no theatrical experience was a boon for Theresa, since this is her first encounter with that "something" that so many of us plan to look into "someday." She's glad her role is small; she doesn't want stage *fright* to be part of her first stage experience! Theresa works in a Respiratory Department, helping people who suffer from shortness of breath.

ERNEST HELLER sounds like a fascinating guy. He decided to get into acting exactly 4 weeks ago, at his wife's suggestion. "! think she was tired of seeing me around the house." Not really a PERSON OF CHARITY in real life, he does nevertheless do his bit for the community by buying his clothes at the Goodwill. He thinks "it is interesting engaging in activities which would likely result in my arrest if performed off-stage." Catch his act while you can, because he will "probably not do this again." Can you guess what Ernest Heller's profession is? He's an Administrative Law Judge.

Playing a sort of Santa Claus personality (MR. FEZZIWIG) appeals to JOE KUHL. He began rehearsing for the role 2 years ago at a day-care center, where he met up with 40 "munchkin-sized people who tried to strip me of my HO HO HO's." Oh dear. Obviously a child prodigy, Joe has been displaying his talents (to the chagrin of passers-by and neighbors) since age 7. A Coastguardsman by profession, Joe's TLT aliases include (by his own admission) Executive Board Member and Part-Time Office Jester/Clown. He played Rhoda's naive daddy in "Bad Seed."

Though he's determined to become rich and famous "just like any other actor" (he's YOUNG SCROOGE), DEVON SCOTT HAVERLY isn't going to step on people on his way up. In anticipation of his success, he's already making it clear that he has his family - especially grandparents Bev and Bud Haverly - to thank. (TLT thanks them, too!) He has performed in the All-City Chorus, a production of "Bye, Bye Birdie" and the May Fest at Jason Lee. This Curtis 8th grader says he's quite different from Young Scrooge in that: "I don't have the money to be a miser!"

After having driven by TLT many times, DEBBIE COX decided at last to come in! She is "very much like" the character of SARAH, whom she admires for her "warm, hospitable and positive" nature. Debbie brings *quite* a background to the theatre. She was a model for 4 years and has been in radio and TV commercials - even a TV movie for ABC! That makes acting her vocation; her avocation is a deep involvement with her church and friends at Christian Faith Center. Debbie would like to either join or form a Christian theatre group. (If you're likewise inclinded, look her up!)

DAVID SAILER (TOM JENKINS) doesn't seem to realize that being a member of the Executive Board of Tacoma Little Theatre requires one to behave with dignity at all times. Is "he gets to stand on a coffin" a proper reason for a *board member* to enjoy a role? Certainly not! And should a board member become an actor just because it's fun? Emphatically no! David even admits that "I don't have any money." Shocking! Somehow we manage to forgive all. Besides his current role as Tom Jenkins, he has appeared as Mr. Daigle in "Bad Seed," AGentleman of Japan in "The Mikado" and Lazar Wolf (the butcher) in "Fiddler On The Roof."

MARGARET McKINNEY (ISABELLE) claims that this is her first acting endeavor, yet tells me that she played Madame Mushroom in her 4th grade production of "As The Stomach Turns." A friend had to force her to come to audition. Margret is a 4th year student at UPS in Music Business, and a member of both the Adelphian Concert Choir and a professional music fraternity. She is much like Isabelle, but "I never intend to have so many children and I don't like the fact that she once loved a ______(this is a family theatre) like Scrooge."

KIM LEONIDAS JORDAN never really decided to become an actress - but it happened anyway! She starred as Christine in this season's "Bad Seed," has portrayed Jenny in "The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie" and Patsy in "Rimers of Eldridge" - as well as appearing in melodramas and doing radio commercials. "Totally different" from MRS. CRATCHIT, Kim hates to sound mushy but what she likes about the character is that "she loves her husband and children, despite her poverty."

Most of the time, JIM GARBER"acts like a student" at UPS. But that's not all the acting he does. The veteran of 7 years of voice lessons, Jim sang in the musicals "Man of La Mancha," "Anything Goes" and "Oklahoma" at the Portland Civic Theatre, as well as in operas at UPS like "The Merry Wives of Windsor" and "The Marriage of Figaro." He and the GHOST OF CHRISTMAS PRESENT have some things in common: Both of them drink a lot and know how to have a good time!

When TRACY THOMPSON says that acting is in her blood, she's not talking in cliches (see Jacob Marley, below). She has played lead roles in many shows, some of which are "Wild Goose Chase" earlier this season at TLT, "Blithe Spirit" and "The Man Who Came to Dinner." She dreams of portraying Amanda Wingfield in "Glass Menagerie," but for now is enjoying GHOST OF CHRISTMAS PAST to the hilt! Though not "a 60 year old lady who travels through 'mist and flash'," Tracy shares determination and a strong sense of humor with her character.

MILT THOMPSON is proud and happy to be in a show with youngest daughter Tracy. He has a lot of talent and experience to pass on to her, having been involved with *eleven* musicals (his wife Anita accompanied for *twelve* of our musicals!), and one drama, "Sabrina Fair." A few of his roles were Billy in "Carousel," Jud in "Oklahoma" and De Becque in "South Pacific." Currently active in a Tacoma mixed vocal group called "On Stage!," Milt wants to play Tevye in "Fiddler on the Roof" someday. Right now, he's playing the ghost of JACOB MARLEY, and has one complaint about the part: "Not enough singing!"

MARJORIE MANKIN and LILA BAARSLAG FEATURED ARTISTS THIS MONTH

The paintings you see decorating our STAGE DOOR GALLERY in the lobby during the run of "Scrooge" are the work of local artists Marjorie Mankin and Lila Baarslag. Both are members of Pacific Gallery Artists, and both are innovators. Marjorie was the originator of the method of applying real spider webs to nature paintings; Lila invented a new, acrylic batik which has the appearance of a watercolor painting. A tormer student of such local notables as Bill Colby, Paul Michaels, William Arthur Phillips, AgnesMcLin and Monte Morrison, Lila won Firs Place in Watercolor in the Lakewood open show a few years ago. Marjorie Mankin is an instructor herself, teaching her craft to students of all ages in her studic at home, and at Clover Park Voc.-Tech. and Fort Lewis.


