

Director's Note.....

Helen Davis, composer of the state song, *Washington My Home*, wrote *Eliza & the Lumberjack* in 1949 as a big Rodgers and Hammerstein style musical to celebrate the centennial of the Washington Territory. In 1953, the Olympic Light Theatre of Olympia presented the world premiere of the play with a cast of 50, yes 50 performers! I have approached Davis' musical from a somewhat more intimate angle, shaping the piece as a melodrama.

The story is set in the late 1870's. We follow the journey of Eliza Thorne, the Philadelphia-raised girl who moves out to the Washington Territory to marry a handsome, but rugged lumberjack, Thomas Barrett. Eliza's prim past puts her in conflict with the rough and tough ways of logging life.

Her dreams of romance are crushed as she encounters the harsh treatment of Thomas, and his sinister partner, Davis Todd. Eliza ultimately discovers her strength and humanity when she challenges Thomas and the problematic values of his lifestyle. But will she live happily ever after?

Logging Language

Bucker — logger who cuts trees into manageably sized logs.

Bullwacker — drives oxen to pull logs to mill.

Choker — a heavy cable used to wrap around trees for skidding.

Goader — pointed instrument used for driving animals.

Hammer — used to drive spikes into trees

Spikes — driven into trees and logs for hauling and climbing purposes.

Marlin — tarred rope used for covering cable.

Spar — a limbed tree that serves as center for rigging used to move felled tree.

Strawline — a thin cable used to haul heavier rigging cable used in skidding logs.


"We need to sing more about the Northwest," she observed. "This is a story of you and me, of our mothers and fathers."

Set in 1877, *Eliza & the Lumberjack* relays the challenges and the triumphs of a feisty young Philadelphia woman who moves to Port Ludlow to marry a lumberjack. Together with Leroy Ostransky, a Tacoma composer-arranger, Davis adapted the story from *Eliza* for the Washington Territorial Centennial celebration in 1953.

Over the course of the next 50 years, Davis has worked on many other projects, including the composition of the state's song *Washington My Home*, and the dedication of Fort Columbia. However, she has always kept *Eliza* alive and growing.

"I have kept it living, kept changing it because it really is a show by the people and for the people. It has a grassroots message. Audiences love to see it, and I love to work on it," she explained.




