In the Beginning ******

Founded in 1909, the Little Theatre movement sought to provide local artists a "little" home of their own: a place to take risks on new works and emerging talent. Their mission was to provide an alternative to commercial theatre and its shortcomings.

At the turn of the century there was a desperate need for change in the American theatre. The Little Theatre movement provided the much needed inspiration for dramatic artists everywhere to pursue & fulfill their impossible dreams.

To this end in 1918, ten passionate artists founded the *Tacoma Center of the America Drama League*. (In the 1930s we evolved into the *Tacoma Little Theatre & Drama League*.) Today, we are known simply as *Tacoma Little Theatre*.

More than 15,000 people have found a creative outlet in Tacoma Little Theatre. Their dedication has brought to life 500 plays, & countless workshops, play readings, & educational programs for the benefit of more than a million people.

The 75th Anniversary is a tribute to the people and the plays that have brought us and countless others together. It is also an opportunity to examine our roots and define our future. Thank you for participating in this endeavor.
