





Director's Notes

Remember the 60s? Regardless of when you were born, you've definitely grown up with the political, musical, and cultural impact from that magical decade.

It was the time of the Beatles. And Viet Nam. And the political killings of Jack and Bobby Kennedy and Martin Luther King, Jr. The Democratic Convention riots. And LBJ and Tricky Dick Nixon. And the man on the Moon and integrated circuits. There was the Summer of Love in '67 and the summer of riots in '68 - and Woodstock in '69.

It was a decade that left an indelible mark on our individual souls and our psyche as a nation. And, yes, I was there. Playing a kind of Andy role. Trying to stay in school during the day, checking the mail for my free all-expense paid excursion to Viet Nam, and writing protest articles and picketing as the spirit moved us.

But we had Neil Simon. Thank goodness. Simon kept us laughing throughout the 60's with Come Blow Your Horn, Barefoot in the Park, The Odd Couple, Sweet Charity, Plaza Suite and The Last of the Red Hot Lovers, among others.


In the midst of creating those plays, he felt the need to be "more political," and was inspired to write *The Star-Spangled Girl* after watching a political argument between liberal writer Paddy Chayefsky and a conservative woman. Though written in 1966-67, *The Star-Spangled Girl* was validated during the campaign of 1992, when political polar opposites did attract: Presidential handlers James Carville (liberal Democrat) and Mary Matalin (conservative Republican) fell in love and later married.

The Star-Spangled Girl is one of Simon's less-often produced plays, probably because he, himself, was too critical of it when it was first produced in 1968. He complained that he should never have tried to be political – "just doesn't work for me" is about what he said. But The Star-Spangled Girl is pure Simon in its dialogue and characters, and the political aspects give way to his wonderful snappy style. He gives his characters situations that let us laugh, both with them and at them. And because most of you haven't seen it before, it gives us at TLT the opportunity to put our own special imprint on the characters and narrative.

It's been my pleasure directing this wonderful cast and play. Listening to hours of music from the 60s to choose some for you was a pleasurable challenge – and brought back great memories.

I sincerely hope that you enjoy *The Star-Spangled Girl* as much as we've loved creating it for you. Please read about the wonderful cast and production team who have worked so hard (and wonderfully) to bring this show to you. The *Star-Spangled Girl* is truly representative of the 60's and how people can come together to accomplish much. I owe our entire team a lot — they are the fantastic people who are creating this experience for you each performance. We hope you'll sit back, not relax too much, and enjoy this show in the same way all of us at TLT enjoy bringing it to you.

It's really not that difficult if you choose the right cast and then get out of their way (except sometimes). He got lucky with the perfect cast and production team for The Star-Spangled Girl - and does feel lovingly toward them. His excitement will continue since TLT will be producing his own hilarious 2-act comedy, Brunch, in June 2010, directed by Naarah McDonald.
