

Director's Notes

For the past forty years, the Irish have been writing some of the most significant plays in the English language. Frank McGuinness ranks alongside Martin McDonagh and Conor McPherson as one of today's most prominent writers. This, of course, follows a long tradition of significant Irish playwrights including: Samuel Beckett, Brendan Behan, William Congrieve, Brian Friel, Oliver Goldsmith, Sean O'Casey, George Bernard Shaw, J.M Synge, and Oscar Wilde. McGuinness is currently one of Ireland's most prolific playwrights. He has penned fourteen original scripts and has translated all of Ibsen's works into English many of which were commissioned by London's Royal National Theatre. Additionally he has translated (from ancient Greek) the works of Sophocles, Euripides and Seneca. His other original translations include three of Chekov's plays, three by Bertolt Brecht and works by the Spanish playwright, Frederico Lorca.

Irish hostage survivor Brian Keenan was kidnapped in 1986 shortly after taking a position as a lecturer of English at the American University in Beirut. He was released in 1990 after talks between the Irish and the Iranian governments. Most of the four years were spent with British journalist John McCarthy and various American hostages.

Shortly after his release, McGuinness contacted Keenan about the possibility of writing a play about Beirut hostages, but stated he would not write it if Keenan felt that harm would come to those still incarcerated there. Keenan writes: "I watched him lay out his ideas before me. Here was a man writing in the dark, but somewhere in his imagination he had found bright sparks of illumination....I could see the touchstones of emotional truth. I simply answered him 'Go for it, Frank,' realizing that I had no right to abort his poignant foetus. Frank McGuinness had shown me and my still imprisoned friends a massive courtesy and sympathy. I could only return it." Subsequently McGuinness wrote this script which opened in London during the summer of 1992 and the following November on Broadway where it played for a year. For Someone Who'll Watch Over Me, he received: the Harvey's Award, the Ewart-Bigg's Peace Award, the Irish-American Literary Prize, a Fringe First Award, an Antoinette Perry Award for Best Play nomination (Tony Award), and the NY Drama Critics Best Foreign Play Award (of 1992).

Suffering and the inhumanity of incarceration have been subject matter for several of the greatest writers in literary history. Some of the most significant novelists of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries provide us with tales of incredible misery. Victor Hugo begins his classic *Les Miserables* with protagonist, Jean Valjean, serving a long sentence for a petty crime. Fyodor Dostoevsky concludes his *Crime and Punishment* with the tormented character Rodya ending up in a despicable prison and

then finding redemption. The twentieth century writers Arthur Koestler (*Darkness at Noon*) and Alexander Solzhenitsyn (*A Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich*) walk us through the miserable existence of their unjustly incarcerated prisoners, Rubashov and Denisovich. Bernard Malamud's Pulitzer Prize novel, *The Fixer*, tells the tale of an imprisoned, yet innocent handy man, Yakov Bok, and his turmoil to save his dignity.

In the past twenty five years, several non-fiction memoirs by former hostages have been published. Senator John McCain chronicles his POW days in Hanoi in *Faith of My Fathers*. Several works deal with actual imprisonment in Beirut including British Archbishop, Terry Waite's *Taken on Trust*, and American journalist Terry Anderson's *Den of Lions: Memoirs of Seven Years*.

All of these works and *Someone Who'll Watch Over Me* certainly take place in a political context, but what is surprising is that these works are largely apolitical. Instead, they focus on the indomitable and impenetrable human spirit. As Michael in this play says, "classical sources reveal the essential optimism...and profound belief in human happiness to triumph over despair." A similar bell rings in *Crime and Punishment* where the essential theme is that suffering leads to enlightenment. Dostoevsky, while in a Siberian prison in 1849, wrote to his brother Mikhail, "To be a human being among human beings, and remain one forever, no matter what misfortunes befall, not to become depressed and not to falter--this is what life is, herein lies its task."

What immediately appealed to me when I first saw this play at the Edinburgh Theatre Festival a few years ago was McGuinness' ability to tell a story and how his use of language and humor permeated the indomitable spirit of his three characters.

Another reason the play appeals to me is that when basic human behavior under the severe duress of incarceration, all formality, civil courtesies, and proper discourse seem to disappear; however, in spite of being forced to our most primal levels of language and behavior, McGuinness shows us that we as human beings ultimately manage to triumph and to rise above it all.

The Playwright

Frank McGuinness was born in Buncrana County Donegal in 1953. He received his BA and M.Phil at University College, Dublin in Medieval Studies. McGuinness previously lectured in Linguistics and Drama at the University of Ulster, Medieval Studies at University College, Dublin and English at the National University of Ireland, Maynooth. In 1981, he turned to writing full time. Then he was a writer-in-residence lecturing at University College Dublin before being appointed Professor of Creative Writing in the School of English, Drama and Film at University College Dublin.

His first major success as a playwright was in 1982 with his production of Factory Girls, a play about four women in a Donegal shirt factory who decide to take up industrial action. He received the London Evening Standard's Most Promising Playwright Award in 1985 for Observe the Sons of Ulster Marching Towards the Somme.




