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DIRECTORS' NOTE

We both came to *The Happiest Song Plays Last* (HSPL), the third in a trilogy by Quiara Alegría Hudes, via its predecessor, *Water by the Spoonful*. Hudes's muse for this vivid collection was her cousin Elliot Ruiz, whose experiences as a young Puerto Rican man finding his way home through the physical, mental, and emotional traumas of military warfare and the battles of everyday life, provided the foundation for the trilogy.

Music is as central to these plays as Elliot himself. *Elliot, A Soldier's Fugue*, the first play in the trilogy, is structurally based loosely on a musical fugue, a contrapuntal composition in which a short melody is introduced by one instrument or part, successively taken up by other instruments, and developed by weaving the melodies together. The play intertwines the story of Elliot, who was gravely wounded in Iraq and, thus, discharged, and those of his "grandpop," father, and mother, all military veterans who served in the Korean, Vietnam, and Iraq Wars.

Water by the Spoonful, which won the Pulitzer Prize, follows Elliot's life after Iraq, as he struggles with crippling injury both psychological and physical and related to his military and familial past. This play resonates with the harmonious dissonance of Free Jazz, "a hard thing to express musically without spinning into noise," according to Hudes; this musical form represents Elliot's cognitive dissonance as he battles an addiction to opioids, denounces his birth mother for her own addiction, and takes the ashes of the mother who raised him—his beloved Aunt Ginny—to scatter in Puerto Rico with his cousin, Yaz. Yaz, a classically trained pianist and professor, is in the midst of her own emotional turmoil. She has the "perfect" home, career, and marriage, but she is disconnected from her family, culture, and—ultimately—herself. By the end of the play, she decides to end her marriage and return to the barrio, the community in which she was raised, to step into Aunt Ginny's role of neighborhood organizer, caretaker, and guide. As she says at the very end of the play, "I'm the elder now. I stay home. I hold down the fort."

The stories of Elliot and Yaz continue in the final play of the trilogy, *The Happiest Song Plays Last*, as does the exploration of real-life events, complexities of family, and the musical embodiment of culture and identity. Yaz and Elliot are on opposite sides of the world with Yaz in Philadelphia settling into her new normal and Elliot in Jordan taking part in a film about the Iraq War. (Elliot Ruiz starred as a Marine in the powerful and devastating acclaimed drama *The Battle of Haditha* which fictionalized actual events, though they were not con-

nected to Ruiz's actual life.) The return to the routines, intensity, and adrenaline of life as a soldier, even one who exists only on film, enables Elliot to escape into a perpetually upbeat, self-assured, animated persona that persists even when the cameras are off. However, trauma and secrets can only be ignored for so long. His life-long relationship with Yaz, who has been a reliable source of love, support, and grounding energy and now needs the same from him, and his developing one with Shar, a young woman filming with him in Jordan, may be irreparably damaged if he cannot find his way back to himself and to his home, so he can finally face the truth and lay a shameful burden to rest.

Like a well-written composition, this play is rich with varied rhythms and textures. It demonstrates the harmony of shared attraction and loyal friendship; high notes of joy, sharp frustration, flat despair; melodies that uplift, change, or linger; chords that may strike as pleasing, unfamiliar, uncomfortable, or surprising. The rhythms and textures of the language, characters, and events are augmented by the live music Hudes requests of those staging this play. Traditionally played on the cuatro, Puerto Rico's national instrument, the live guitar music you hear tonight is a collection of Puerto Rican standards, transcribed by musician Anand Landon, that reflect Puerto Rican traditions. We are thankful for the work and collaboration of our two gifted musicians, Anand and Storm Tucker.

As with the live music, we have happily heeded all of the playwright's wishes as authentically as we could in casting, staging, storytelling, and music. We have worked diligently to be true to the world of the play and realities of the characters (many of whom were based on real people) and to build a show that uses nuance to ensure that characterizations are multidimensional and representative and avoid stereotypes. We are profoundly grateful to our company and crew, both of which include marvelous UW Tacoma students, for their beautiful and generous gifts to this production, a unique collaboration among TLT, UWT, and Toy Boat Theatre.

We are also grateful to you, our audience and patrons, who continue to support community theatre and other artistic endeavors that include, reflect, and celebrate the vast diversity that exists within our community of Tacoma and the South Sound region. All of our stories are essential. We could not share them without you.

STAFF BIOGRAPHIES

Marilyn Bennett (Director)

Marilyn received her Ph.D. in Theatre History and Criticism from the University of Washington, Seattle. She has taught and administered theatre programs at St. Lawrence University, Hamilton College, Humboldt University, University of San Diego, and University of Puget Sound. An Equity actor, Marilyn has performed on stage and in television in Washington, California, New York, and Virginia, and has directed over fifty academic and professional productions. She is also the Managing Artistic Director of Toy Boat Theatre in Tacoma, and a frequent guest artist at Tacoma Arts Live in Tacoma, and recently retired as a Visiting Professor of Theatre at the University of Puget Sound. Marilyn seeks to bring affordable, inspiring theatre to communities less well served: "Theatre should lift the spirit, engage the mind, excite the senses, and belong to everyone. It is our most vibrant way of sharing our stories and ourselves." She has been blessed with 50 years of partnership with guitarist/teacher Peter Pendras, and 34 years with their son Trevor, also an accomplished guitarist.

Lydia K. Valentine (née Roberts) (Assistant Director/Dramaturg)

This season is full of collaboration with TLT for Lydia, and the return to live theatre has been lifegiving. Lydia was the Dramaturg for the dynamic empathos company/TLT Off the Shelf production of *Boudica*. The Happiest Song Plays Last is the latest product of her partnership with Toy Boat Theatre, and bringing this show to life with Marilyn and this phenomenal (and hilarious) cast and crew has been incredibly fun and fulfilling. She will wrap up the season as Director for The Luck of the Irish, and she hopes to see you there! 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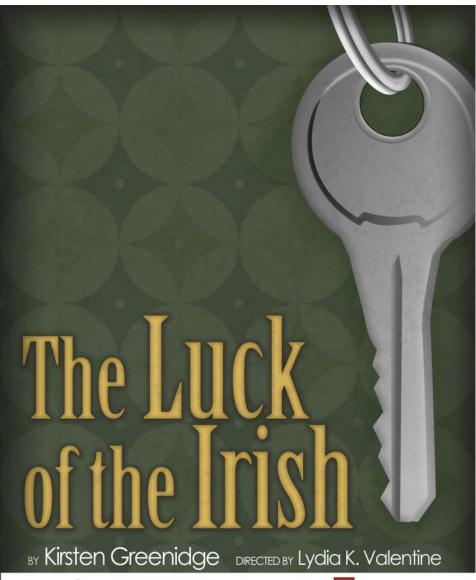
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
